Jacksonville began as an Indian nation that grew due to European (1). As the		
population of Spanish, French, and British people increased, the number of Indians		
dropped, which was partly due to an increase in () from the aggressiveness		
of the incoming populations. In addition, the European settlers gradually forced		
many Indian tribes out into the frontier parts of the US through (<u>3</u>). The area		
became known for its plantations and lumber, which depended on the (4)
